8TH BISHOP OF ALASKA



Christ the King

This Sunday, November 21, is the last Sunday of the Church year. Often called "Christ the King Sunday," the Collect for the day expresses God's will "to restore all things in [Jesus Christ], the King of kings and The Rt. Rev. Mark Lattime Lord of lords." Christ the King Sunday reminds us that

our vision, our hope, and our ministry is the Kingdom of God—God's will on earth as it is in heaven.

In celebrating Christ the King Sunday we are also called to recognize the tension created by our dual citizenship. We are first and foremost citizens of the Kingdom of God—subjects of Christ the King whose way of love and sacrifice are the marks of His authority. But we are also citizens of this nation and called by the same way of love and sacrifice revealed in Jesus to participate in a civic life that seeks the common good, loving neighbor as self, welcoming the stranger, serving all.

Every Christian is called to act faithfully and to be involved in politics and civic life. This is how we exercise our baptismal vows to seek justice and peace among all people and promote love of neighbor. As Christians, we are called to advance Christian principles in our civic life as we engage peacefully with all citizens of this nation in serving the common good. We are not called to advance Christian power, culture, or privilege. more, as citizens of the Kingdom of God, we must resist all temptations to national idolatry. measure of our civic and political actions must always be the person and witness of Jesus Christ: his love, his humility, his sacrificial life and his radical welcome. Jesus Christ is Lord. His way of love is authoritative.

That way of love does not call for nor support Christian nationalism.

Every major Christian denomination has rejected Christian nationalism as a threat to both faithful and holy Christian political engagement and a healthy democratic society. I joined our Presiding Bishop, Michael Curry, my fellow bishops, and faith leaders from every mainline denomination in signing a statement against Christian nationalism. I urge you to read that statement and to spend some time becoming familiar with the distinction between faithful Christian political engagement and Christian nationalism.

As the bishop of this diocese, I am responsible for guarding the faith, unity and discipline of this Church, I am also called to serve as chief pastor, therefore, I must state clearly that while I do encourage all Episcopalians in Alaska to be faithfully involved in civic life and leadership, I do not support, indeed I reject outright, the foundational characteristics and tenets of Christian nationalism. Having said that, I strongly urge all Episcopalians in this Diocese to learn more about the characteristics of Christian nationalism in contrast to faithful Christian political participation

The first course offering began on November 16th. There will be another program starting in January.


"Being Biblical Citizens requires a knowledge of Biblical principles and how to apply them to the world around us."
